



PREFACE

The editorial board of *Diadorim: revista de estudos linguísticos e literários* (open access journal) is honoured to present another volume, composed of two dossiers: literature and language.

The *second issue of volume 23 of Diadorim: revista de estudos linguísticos e literários* is published by the Postgraduate Program in Vernacular Letters of the Faculty of Letters of the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro. The two dossiers bring texts that are articulated around themes defined by Brazilian and foreign researchers, invited to act as editors of the issue that is presented. The contributions, in the form of peer-reviewed articles, guest articles and interviews, reflect the multiplicity of perspectives on the themes proposed in the issue, from the perspective of researchers associated with institutions in Brazil and abroad.

Following the recommended editorial guidelines, the editors of the issue assumed the function of, upon receipt of the articles, submitting them to the process of double-blind review among researchers who are linked to the thematic areas of the dossiers. The result of this practice is this volume which brings together: 2 interviews with researchers working in the areas listed in this issue, 27 articles - 24 submitted to the peer review process and 3 guest texts. The volume also includes the presentation texts of the two dossiers.

The **thematic dossier of literary studies in the second issue of volume 23 of *Diadorim: revista de estudos linguísticos e literários*** brings together texts on Portuguese voyages and the encounters and mismatches of transoceanic adventures. The dossier is organized by **Rodrigo Alexandre Carvalho Xavier** (Federal University of Rio de Janeiro), **Jerónimo Pizarro** (Universidad de los Andes) and **Isabel Soler** (Universitat de Barcelona).

The **thematic dossier on linguistic studies in the second issue of volume 23 of *Diadorim: revista de estudos linguísticos e literários*** brings together research that focuses on the connection between Morphology and various perspectives of analysis. The dossier is

organized by **Carlos Alexandre Gonçalves (Federal University of Rio de Janeiro), Graça Rio-Torto (University of Coimbra) and João Carlos Tavares da Silva (State University of Rio de Janeiro/ Centre for Science and Distance Higher Education of the State of Rio de Janeiro).**

We owe our thanks to the guest editors of this issue. We extend our regards to the researchers who - in the midst of so many issues to manage - contributed with their expertise to the evaluation of the texts submitted to the two dossiers that make up the second issue of volume 23.

We are happy to present to the scientific community another issue in which reflections on literary and linguistic issues come together. We expect that this publication will offer the reader with a broad overview of the issues that revolve around the proposed themes. We hope that those interested will enjoy the debates gathered here!

We wish you all good reading! And we hope that this issue can contribute to the circulation of knowledge and the promotion of new debates.
